


FROM THE PRINCIPAL

There have been so many highlights over the past term, with students demonstrating their unique gifts across a wide range of endeavours. Our students and staff have continued to manage well on our restricted site, as work progresses with the building of our new facilities. Each day brings new development in both blocks; it is so exciting! I love driving on the Queenstown Road motorway off ramp now, the view of our build is inspiring.

STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

- Polyfest 2021 involved approximately 180 of our students and was hugely successful, thanks to so many people students, staff, former students, parents and families.
 - Fiafia evenings were wonderful community celebrations, held at Royal Oak Intermediate and Onehunga High School.
 - Polyfest saw outstanding performances from our Maori, Chinese, Cook Island, Indian, Niuean, Samoan and Tongan groups, as well as students in the Cook Island, Samoan and Tongan speech competitions.
 - Our Tongan group placed 1st and Niuean group 1st and 3rd for their group performances in selected categories. Danica Kopelani 9Cs placed 2nd in the Samoan Speech Competition and Sione Havili 12So placed 2nd in the Tongan Speech Competition.
- Services Academy Director Vijay Lal and Level 3 Services students represented Onehunga High School at the ANZAC ceremony in Mangere this year.

FROM THE PRINCIPAL

16 Onehunga High School scholarships in total is exactly the same number as the last two years, with 7 Level 3 scholarships being our most ever at that level, which is very promising.

- Snow Ba 9Fa, Nafisa Bulale 9Gi, Dana Faisel 9Gd, Faith Fineanganofo 13Lu and Maia Potini-Bowen 13Md all pitched a 60 second Tiny Talk before being hosted at TEDxAuckland.
- Our Kapa Haka group wowed everyone with their performance at the official House Blessing Ceremony at Ara Auckland Airport Jobs and Skills Hub
- Our Careers department worked with the Drive team at the Chamber to support 59 students who have now achieved their Learner Driver Licence
- Daisy Fuavao 13Lu and Gabriella Manu 13Tn both received scholarships to attend the NZ Model UN conference in Wellington unfortunately
 this was cancelled due to the Wellington region being in COVID Alert Level 2, but the girls' achievement stands.
- Level 2/3 Catering students hosted our annual cocktail evening; they set up the venue, and planned, prepared and served delicious food. The evening was a convivial way to acknowledge the contribution of so many members of our wider community to the success of Onehunga High School, as well as to launch our request for people to consider contributing further to our redevelopment.
- On Friday 2 July, Matariki rose with Tama-nui-te-rā and in the lunar phase of Tangaroa, signalling Te Mātahi o te tau the Māori new year. Thank you to Whaea Phinia Evans and whanau, our Te Reo Māori students and the many other contributors who supported our celebration of the beginning of Matariki with a beautiful hāngi.

ZONING

The Ministry of Education is proposing a new enrolment scheme for Sir Douglas Bader Intermediate and to amend the Royal Oak Intermediate home zone so that the southern portion of the home zone is reduced to align with the boundary of Onehunga High School.

ENROLMENTS

Students who live in the Onehunga High School zone are welcome to enrol at any time. In order to ensure that we have capacity to best serve all students' needs, the board of trustees confirms that for 2022, we will ballot to offer out-of-zone places for:

- 70 Year 9 students
- 5 students at each of Years 10, 11, 12 and 13.

NCEA CHANGE PROGRAMME

Feedback is sought on the proposed NCEA subjects derived from The New Zealand Curriculum (at Levels 2 and 3) and Te Marautanga o Aotearoa (across all levels), until 11 August.

The proposals include new mātauranga Māori subjects in The New Zealand Curriculum and in Te Marautanga o Aotearoa to reflect Mana ōrite mō te mātauranga Māori (parity for Māori knowledge). The proposals also support opportunities for greater specialisation at Levels 2 and 3.

CAREERS INSIGHTS SEMINARS HELP INFORM DECISION MAKING




Term 2 has seen many of our Year 13 students attending 'Careers Insights Seminars', arranged according to students' areas of interest. A group of students looking to gain a deeper insight into what it might be like to study law and criminology were able to hear from two young lawyers from Meredith Connell about their experiences at law school and working in a law firm. Our students interested in joining the police force were able to discuss with Sergeant Deane McEntee the realities of being a police officer, while

a further seminar hosted by Paul Hunter from the New Zealand Defence Force informed and enthused students about the many career pathways in the armed forces. A very popular seminar was held for those interested in Trades careers, with information about different trade options, scholarships and financial incentives available, as well as pre-apprenticeship programmes. Seminars for other students, including those interested in social work and teaching, were also on offer, and more workshops will be held throughout Term 3.

YEAR 10'S INVESTIGATE TECH CAREERS

20 of our Year 10 students attended the Tech21 Summit at the Vodafone Events centre which showcased NZ and international tech innovation and creativity. Students were exposed to possible careers in technology, which helped them to see the application and relevance of STEAM

(Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Mathematics) subjects. As well as hearing from inspirational speakers, they were able to participate in an interactive expo zone, where they could experience innovations first-hand and engage with employers in the tech sector.



CONNECTING SCHOOL AND THE WORLD OF WORK

Exposure to the world of work provides an important information gathering opportunity. This term, Level 2 and 3 Catering students had the opportunity to visit two of Auckland's top restaurants, Ostro and Amano, and on a guided tour got to see the many roles available in restaurants. They heard from people in a range of positions, and from staff who had started as dishwashers and 'glassies' and worked their way up to senior positions. The following week, they visited Service Foods and learnt about many more job functions, as they have an inhouse butchery, fishmongers and vegetable preparation departments for example, and also support roles in fields such as sales, logistics, IT and transport. As well as the opportunity to observe workers in action during a guided tour of the facilities, they were able to interact with many employees of Service Foods, including the CEO who came in to meet with the OHS visitors and

share his experience and advice with them. Another group of students passionate about product design went out this term to investigate career and study options and were inspired by future possibilities in the field, especially when combined with a passion

for technology. Other students interested in architecture and sustainability went out to research this field - with Ma'ata Mafi commenting "I learnt so much about what is out there from visiting and it firmed up for me the direction I want to go in."



TERTIARY PROVIDER PRESENTATIONS

Year 13's considering study next year at university or polytech, were this term invited to attend interactive presentations from each of the Auckland tertiary institutions, as well as from Victoria, Waikato and Otago universities. Students were able to learn about the unique features of each and consider which study environments might be a good fit for them. All of the providers will return again early term 3 to support students in planning their courses and answer questions around the application process and scholarships.



YEAR 12'S DEVELOP LEADERSHIP AND PATHWAY PLANNING SKILLS

10 of our Year 12 students recently represented OHS at The Pacific Island Leaders of Tomorrow programme (PILOT). Exploring the theme "Our ancestors were once PILOTS of the ocean", students were able to prepare and plan for their own journey ahead into employment or further study. Eight of our Year 12 Māori students

had the opportunity to attend the Kei a Tātou te Ihi (KATTI) leadership programme. As well as hearing from inspirational speakers and exploring tertiary study options, this day was a much enjoyed chance for whanaungatanga and building of networks.



DRIVEN TO SUCCEED!

A driver's licence is highly valued by employers. This term, thanks to a partnership between the Auckland Chamber of Commerce and the Ministry of Social Development, 59 of our students had the opportunity to participate in a fully subsidised Road Code workshop and then sit their learner licence test in at school with VTNZ. We were very proud that 100% of the students who sat the test achieved their learner licence and were able to achieve NCEA credits for these great results.

FCB NEW ZEALAND VISIT

On the 6th May FCB New Zealand came to visit Level 2 and 3 business students. FCB is an advertising agency and they wanted our views on an idea they were working on for The Lowdown, which is an organisation that supports teenagers with their mental health.
